



Surveys of Trust in the U.S. Health Care System

AmeriSpeak Survey

Interview Dates: December 29, 2020 – January 26, 2021

This survey was conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago. Data were collected using the AmeriSpeak panel, NORC's probability based panel designed to be representative of the U.S. household population. Panel members were randomly drawn from AmeriSpeak.

The final stage completion rate is 23.3%. The overall margin of sampling error is +/-3.15 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence level, including the design effect. The margin of sampling error may be higher for subgroups.

Once the sample has been selected and fielded, and all the study data have been collected and made final, a post-stratification process is used to adjust for any survey nonresponse as well as any non-coverage or under and oversampling resulting from the study specific sample design. Post-stratification variables included age, gender, census division, race/ethnicity, and education. Weighting variables were obtained from the Current Population Survey. The weighted data reflects the U.S. population of adults age 18 and over.
